This is in continuation of the visit of the UGC Visiting Committee to consider the XI Plan General Development Grant Allocation to your University.

2. Based on the Report submitted by the XI Plan UGC Visiting Committee and availability of funds from the Government of India, UGC has approved the tentative XI Plan Allocation, subject to availability of funds from Government of India, in respect of your University as under:

i) General Development Grant	562.50	
ii) Merged Schemes	270.70	
iii) Internal Quality assurance cell	5.00	

3. The 'on account' grant already under the above schemes released by UGC during XI Plan Period will be a part of XI Plan Allocation of the university. Further, funds for Merged Schemes is based on the eligibility criteria indicated in the XI Plan Guidelines. Therefore, the grant for each of the merged scheme will be released subject to the fulfillment of the eligibility criteria and other related norms as laid down for the purpose.
4. A new scheme called Internal Quality Assurance Cell has also been included in the merged schemes and an additional amount of Rs.5.00 lakhs has been allocated to each State University. The Guidelines of this Scheme may be seen on UGC website [www.ugc.ac.in](http://www.ugc.ac.in)
5. The XI Plan Allocation is subject to compliance of the Academic Reforms as already circulated by the UGC vide its D.O.No.F.1-2/2008 (XI Plan) dated 30<sup>th</sup> March/21<sup>st</sup> April, 2009 which is also available on UGC website [www.ugc.ac.in](http://www.ugc.ac.in).
6. In addition to above, the following Administrative Reforms may also be implemented:
- Implementation of the Govt. of India Reservation Policy of SC/ST.
  - All Statutory posts should be filled up the appointment through Selection Committee as per the UGC Regulations.
  - All vacant Teaching Posts should be filled up expeditiously.
  - Annual Accounts, Annual Reports and Quality assessment Status Report should be submitted in time i.e. by 31<sup>st</sup> December of every year.
7. The release of grant will also be linked to Academic and Administrative Reforms as well as compliance of various policies of Government of India rules.
8. You are also requested to utilize proportionate grant on half yearly basis. Any portion which remain unutilized will be considered to be lapsed. UGC will also consider to



allocate the unutilized grant of the university to other universities which are better performing and are also following the various academic reforms as well as implementation of various policies of Government of India. Therefore, the University is advised to utilize the grant fully.

9. The amount recommended by the Visiting Committee for various merged schemes may be utilized as per guidelines of respective schemes available on UGC website. The anomaly if any as per pattern of assistance/guidelines may be brought to the notice of the Commission.
10. You are, therefore requested to re-work the priorities of university within the General Development Grant allocation as decided by the Commission and keeping in view the recommendation of the Visiting Committee. The revised proposal (item-wise and year-wise plan) in the prescribed format UGC (copy enclosed) may be sent within 15 days in duplicate along with the soft copy within the ceiling conveyed to University. After receipt of the item-wise allocation within the amount as decided by the Committee, the UGC will convey the final approval of XI Plan Allocation to the University.
11. A copy of the Report of the Visiting Committee is enclosed herewith for further necessary action at the University level.

#### PROCEDURE ADOPTED BY THE COMMITTEE

At the outset, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. K.K. Aggarwal welcomed the members of the committee and gave a brief presentation and introduction of the Senior Faculty members to the committee. Prof. O.P. Goyal, Director, Corporate affairs gave a presentation on the working of the university, its achievements during X plan and its requirements in the XI Plan.

After formal discussions with the Vice Chancellors, Deans and Senior Faculty Members, the committee divided itself into two group to visit the Departments.

The Committee also had separate meeting with the teaching staff, non-teaching staff and students. All the three categories of staff members and students were very vocal and were quite satisfied with the facilities being provided by the university for the development as well as for teaching and research. The Committee was also happy to note that the university has instituted fellowships at its own level at par with NET qualified candidates for the students doing Ph.D. in various departments. The students however, wanted to have a separate lab for them rather than having combined lab with the teachers.

### **PHYSICAL INFRASTRUCTURE – PRESENT AND PROPOSED**

At present the university is housed at Kashmere Gate Campus which in an area of 17.12 acres.

The University has further acquired land for construction of its two additional campuses; the details are as below:

WEST CAMPUS – DWARKA CAMPUS  
Sector-16C, Dwarka, New Delhi-110075  
Campus area : 60.436 acres

The contract for the construction work of Phase I of Dwarka Campus has already been awarded to M/s Bridge and Roof Company (India) Limited and its Phase I shall be completed by October, 2008.

**EAST CAMPUS – SURAJMAL VIHAR CAMPUS**  
Surajmal Vihar, Delhi. Campus area : 18.75 acres.

At Surajmal Vihar Campus, the University has planned for the construction of an Indian Institute of Information Technology. The work of boundary wall and peripheral plantation along with earth filling is under progress and soil investigation has been completed. Conceptual Approval from DUAC has been obtained. Preliminary Estimate for Phase-I of the project is under consideration by GNCTD.

8. **BRIEF NOTE ON THE ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY DURING X PLAN**

The University from the very outset focused on professional studies both at the Undergraduate level and at Post-Graduate level with a view to harness and direct the enormous talent available in the country. Believing in the Philosophy of continuing education, the university has started a number of Post-Graduate level week end programmes in Management, Technology and Mass communication for working Professionals which have become very popular. The University has State of the art infrastructure to back the core-curriculum and providing students an intellectually stimulating environment for them over all growth and development. The class rooms are equipped with modern day teaching aids such as LCD projectors , Electronic screens, computer with internet connectivity. Each School has fully air-conditioned seminar hall for conducting various activities such as workshops, conference, symposia etc. apart from an auditorium and Seminar Hall available I the University.

### **ACCREDITATION BY NAAC**

In December, 2006, the University offered for its accreditation to the *National Assessment and Accreditation Council, Bangalore* and as part of it, the University submitted its reports in three volumes titled as : (i) Self Study Report : Institutional Data (Part – I), (ii) Self Study Report: The Evaluative Report (Part –II) and (iii) Appendices [Including Essential Supportive Material – Part-III]. At the end of this exercise *the NAAC Graded this University as 'A' for a period of five years, i.e. 31st march, 2007 to 31st march, 2012* after rigorous validation of its each and every activity.

### **ISO 9001 : 2000 CERTIFICATION**

The University has been further Certified as ISO 9001: 2000 University by Standardization Testing and Quality Certification Directorate, Ministry of Communications and Information Technology, Govt. of India for a period of three years to be counted from February 07, 2008; as per STQC Directorate, it is an internationally recognized certification.

### **RECOGNITION FROM DISTANCE EDUCATION COUNCIL, IGNOU, NEW DELHI**

The Distance Education Council, IGNOU has also given its recognition to the University's Directorate of Open and Distance Education to start different academic programmes through open and distance mode w.e.f. academic session 2008-09.

### **OTHER ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY**

All the existing 08 University Schools of Studies (University School of Management Studies, University School of Biotechnology, University School of Information Technology, University School of Environment Management, University School of Basic and Applied Sciences, University School of Chemical Technology, University School of Law and Legal Studies and University School of Humanities and Social Sciences) have already acquired their warranted status of

National/International Recognition – a fact which stands evidenced by the following :

- The University School of Management Studies has been accredited with A++ Rank in Best Business Schools Survey (October 21, 2007). The School has also entered into a Strategic Tie-up with CREDAI NCR, the Delhi-NCR Chapter of the Confederation of Real Estate Developers Association of India (CREDAI) to set up a Centre for Research in Real Estate and Infrastructure Development.
- The University School of Biotechnology has been Ranked at Second number for B.Tech. (Biotechnology) programme by Cyber Media published in Bio-spectrum in January, 2007.
- The University School of Information Technology has come to be recognized at the Global Level as is evident by the overriding fact that the Govt. of Laos PDR has sponsored a batch of 30 students belonging to their country to study MCA (Software Systems) at the Campus of Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University.
- The participants of Five Year Integrated B.A.,LL.B (Hons) programme belonging to the University School of Law and Legal Studies have been adjudged as Finalists twice, i.e. during 2005 and 2006 at the International Arbitration Moot Court Competitions held at Vienna, aside participating in large number of International Moot Court Competitions organized in different parts of the world. Also, one of the Scholar belonging to this School successfully completed in 2007 the Diploma in Private International Law from HAGUE Academy of International Law.
- Another student, pursuing LL.B.(Hons) from this School has recently bagged a fully-funded scholarship to the National University of Singapore to pursue her Master's in Law.
- Not only this, the faculty of this School has been able to show its presence at the Global Level by organizing Workshops on Legal

Education as for example at Kabul, Afghanistan in 2007. Again, its faculty members have been enlisted in Marquis Who's Who in the world in its Silver Jubilee Edition, 2008.

- Quite a good number of successful students belonging to the School of Biotechnology, School of Basic and Applied Sciences, School of Chemical Technology, School of Information Technology and School of Environment Management are now pursuing their advanced research at the globally renowned Universities of the world such as Harvard University, London School of Economics, Princeton University, Illinois University, Chicago University, Pen State University, Cambridge University, etc.
- The Ministry of Science and Technology has recently approved (February, 2008) the M.Tech. in Nano Science and Technology to be conducted at this University effective from the academic session 2008-09 along with the essential funding.
- The faculty of the University has been able to publish on an average One Research Paper per week in Nationally and Internationally acclaimed Journals. Further, some of the faculty members of this University have been able to publish their Research Papers in International Journals carrying the benchmark of 'High Impact Factor' equivalent to 10 such as 'ADVANCED MATERIALS.' [*The 2005 Impact Factor of Advanced Materials was 9.107*]
- To this list, it is added that the University has also entered into an MOU with the Maharashtra Knowledge Corporation Limited, Mumbai for provisioning of Digital University ®software framework and Digital College ®software framework to offer "e-services" to the students registered with the University and its affiliated institutions and the University officials through the Digital University of MKCL in a hosted environment.

9. **BRIEF NOTE ON THE AREAS IN WHICH UNIVERSITY NEEDS IMPROVEMENT. RESEARCH FACILITIES TO BE AUGMENTED.**

- The university need more innovative thinking to reach out to the community.
- The university needs more industrial collaboration to increase the placement opportunity.
- More or good number of sports fields are to be established with more options to the students to become athletes and physically fit citizens.
- The university shall take all steps to attract more foreign students in the years to come.
- Quality research relevant to the society needs to be encouraged and necessary funding may be arranged for this purpose from various sources.

10. **FUTURE INSIGHT RECOMMENDED BY THE COMMITTEE FOR THE UNIVERSITY.**

- The University shall carry out examination reforms, examination automation, on line examination systems for internal assessment, intership for on the job training and other methods of adaptive learning systems for students progression.
- The University shall provide opportunities to graduates in graduates in studying career oriented ICT related courses with affordable tuition fee and through earn while you learn schemes.
- The University should establish a Science Museum and a Folkore Museum to disseminate the knowledge to the students and motivate them to study such subjects.
- The University shall think of establishing a National Centre for Earth and Atmospheric Sciences considering the need to create the future scientific manpower.

- Add-on courses at Undergraduate level may help the affiliated colleges to train their students in career based learning.
- Strengthening of existing courses and newly started courses may help consolidating the University's strength to concretize its output.
- The University shall regularize the employees of group B & C and provide opportunities for upgradation into group B positions based on their performance, efficiency and academic qualifications.

**11. OBSERVATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE DEVELOPMENT PLAN OF THE UNIVERSITY, IN THE FOLLOWING AREAS :**

**i. Access**

The University has provided access to higher education to a large number of students in professional courses from rural and backward areas, which are very evident from the admission statistic. There is a continuous increase in the students strength which is a positive sign of the University for its future growth and dimension.

**ii. Equity**

The equity has been fully maintained in this University, so far as its distribution of staff and students are concerned. The University has already shown national character in its population. The number of affiliated institutions are also increasing, which is a reasonable factor for the university's growth and development.

**iii. Relevance**

The University, over a period of time has identified good number of need based and interdisciplinary courses which help the students to learn with flexibility of choosing and softcore and hardcore subjects and socially relevant projects. The system of



education delivered by the university has more social relevance and has also provided enough opportunities for placements.

**iv. Quality and Excellence**

It is a fact that this university has already put forward its steps to provide quality education and is certainly on this platform of academic excellence. The parameters of any assessment system will surely indicate the factors of its level to a better position and provide equal opportunities to all students, staff, scholars and the stakeholders.

**v. University Administration**

The University, under the leadership of its Vice Chancellor Prof. K.K. Aggarwal has taken a strong policy in maintaining transparency in administration right from purchase to certification of candidates in awarding the degrees. There are good number of dedicated administrative officers and staff to support the new initiatives in developing the university.

**vi. Development of Teachers**

Almost all the faculty members in this university are contributing the most possible in the academic performances of the departments and Schools. There is a strong and appreciable academic culture developed during the recent years which is evident in the release of International Journals and other publications.

**vii. Facilities to Students**

The students do need more facilities in this modern world and technology and development. The student progression is remarkable and the facilities provided to students shall be improved with participatory mechanisms.

**viii. Any other observation(s) of the Visiting Committee**

- Beside continuous evaluation of the students, the university has an excellent system of securing feed back from the students about the performance of teachers. Feed back to the teachers with an explicit objective of furtherance of their class-room performance, counselling of the weak students by the faculty, organizing of lectures for the benefit of faculty, staff and students on every Wednesday of the week under the aegis of 'Indraprastha Colloquium" having the 'Best teacher of the university' every year on Teacher's Day i.e. September 05 of each year, are some of the innovative ideas.
- Further to maintain the quality check on Ph.D. a provision has been introduced that no research scholar is allowed to submit his / her Ph.D. thesis unless he / she has published minimum of 2 Research Papers in International (refereed) Journals' is rather applaudable. Conduct of Deans meeting at frequent intervals under the Chairmanship of the Vice Chancellor is another important strong point of the financing of this university as it facilitates the gathering of new ideas which are ultimately culminating into introduction of innovative programmes of this university.
- The University has introduced the weekend programmes. With this the professional and administrative working in corporate sector/ Government Institutes are encouraged to undertake further research activities.
- The University has made provisions of recognizing the institutes, which have excelled in specific areas as "approved research centres". Some of these approved centres are:


