The role of culture, ethnicity and context in psychotherapy has been gaining more attention in the past few decades, particularly as the populations seeking psychological services grow increasingly diverse. This diversity can be of cultural background, socio-demographic characteristic or of a special ability.

In India, culturally responsive therapy is still not adequately understood, researched or addressed. Even globally, there is a distinct gap between the stated intent of incorporating cultural differences into current evidence-based treatments, and actual clear guidelines for accomplishing this goal. It has been seen that culturally-responsive and sensitive therapists are able to effectively express an understanding of what the patient's goals and needs in therapy are, are more emotionally in-tune with clients, and demonstrate appropriate management of cultural experiences raised by the client. There is also some evidence that patients' perceptions of how culturally competent the provider is can affect the working alliance. Since Cross-cultural psychotherapy is a complex and multi-layered process, which requires a great deal of awareness and cultural competence in providing mental health intervention, this poses particular challenges in training and supervision of providers. The need is therefore not only to develop resources/guidelines for therapy but also to establish models of appropriate training so as to be able to provide the most comprehensive care, and to meet the needs of individuals who, regardless of culture, social status, or sexual orientation, are coming to practitioners for help in their times of distress.

The CBT model has idiosyncratic case conceptualisation as one of its basic components but in the light of increasing diversity in the patient population, it is important to pay closer attention to making the therapy more culturally attuned to the patient's needs. In addition, therapists have to be trained to assess, conceptualise and address the uniqueness of each patient's internal as well as external context, such as to make maximise outcome. The aim of this Conference is to address cultural-responsiveness in psychotherapy in general and in cognitive behavioural approaches in particular, in the light of global developments in this filed and the uniqueness of Indian context. Submission Guidelines & Procedures

- 1. Abstracts must be submitted via e-mail to iccbi2017@gmail.com on or before 30th December 2016.
- 2. Abstracts must be written in ENGLISH only, and should not exceed 250 words (Not including title, authors and

affiliations).

- 3. Abstracts must be in text format, DO NOT include any graphs, tables or images.
- 4. Abstracts should contain work that has not been previously published.
- 5. You must indicate whether you wish to have your abstract considered for OPEN PAPERS (OP) or POSTER

PRESENTATION (P). Please provide the presenter's brief biography in no more than 200 words.

Abstracts must be submitted using the designated field: Introduction, Methodology, Results, Discussion and

Conclusion. We particularly welcome abstracts closely related to the conference theme.

7. Abstract title should be typed in Times New Roman font, size 12 with 1.5 line spacing.

8. Accepted abstracts are eligible for presentation after receiving full registration fee from the author/presenter.

If registration fee of the presenter is not received by due date, his/her paper is assumed to have been withdrawn. Once the abstract is submitted, changes, correction or rewording are not allowed. The submission

should be carefully proof-read and corrected by the author. Individual authors are responsible for the accuracy of the information supplied, as accepted abstracts will be printed or showcased in the Congress publication materials.

9. All Abstracts will be reviewed by the Scientific Committee. Only those abstracts judged to be of high quality

and of relevance will be accepted. Acceptance notification will be sent to the first submitting author and presenter with further instructions. Final presentation style will be subject to the decision of the Committee.

10. Failure to comply with these requirements will exclude the abstract from consideration.






