Question Paper Structure

Question No. 1 shall contain 8 parts representing all units of the syllabus and students shall have to answer any five (weightage 4 marks each).
- 2. Out of the remaining seven questions, students shall be required to attempt any five questions. There will be minimum one and maximum two questions from each unit of the syllabus. The weightage of Ouestion No. 2 to 8 shall be 10 marks each.
