


- 1. (b) Political parties give more attention to campaign when election day comes near. **Intensify** means to make more intense.
- 2. (a) Political parties always talk of manifestos during election meetings.

  Manifesto means promises made by a party during election.
- 3. (c) Votes are always casted.
- 4. (b) Mar means to harm; to spoil.
- 5. (c) During election the whole process of casting of votes, security of ballot boxes, etc. is also called polling.
